



This is the third attempt in 8 years

- Fire Administrative Services Agreement 2016
- Annexation into ConFire 2021
- Failed contract for service RFP 2024



Strategic Plan 2022-2027

- Need to improve fire prevention inspection and reporting processes
- Provide liability reduction training to all employees and board members
- Develop a Standards of Cover (SOC) document
- Develop a two-year training plan
- Update succession planning/professional development policies
- Develop a system to review/update policies every three years
- Explore the value of mobile fire mechanic service
- Develop a community engagement plan
- Identify cost efficient measures to maintain or improve ISO protection class
- Provide fire safety education to all elementary schools and develop a junior safety group
- Partner with the high school to provide students community service opportunities at the fire stations
- Partner with local community colleges to provide fire trainee opportunities
- Develop a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) cadre
- Explore a contract for service or consolidation with a larger fire agency

CONSULTANT REPORT

Long-Term Sustainability Analysis

- ConFire subsidizes the RHFD with over \$1 million in services annually
 - Battalion Coverage (\$1,000,000)
 - Extended Operational Support (\$5,000)
 - Fire Investigation (\$20,000)
 - Water Rescue (\$40,000)
 - Technical Rescue (trench, high/low angle, confined space, etc.) (\$35,000)
 - Hazardous Materials Technician/Specialist response (\$40,000)
 - Critical Incident Debriefing (\$5,000)
 - Majority of Operational Standard Operating Guidelines (\$10,000)

Total: \$1,155,000

- Firefighter training and use of ConFire training grounds (required to maintain ISO)
- Grant writing (large regional grants)
- Emergency management/planning services
- Backfilling District Coverage
- Operational Area Coordination (e.g. Strike Team deployment, out of county response)



Long-Term Sustainability Analysis



- Outsource fire prevention inspections, plan-check, vegetation management services (\$130,000) In progress
- Contract with ConFire for extended operational support (\$5,000 or cost recovery)
- Add (1) 40-hour Training Officer (\$460,000 -\$500,000)
- Reassign 56-hour Battalion Chief to 40-hour Deputy Fire Chief (\$48,000 \$60,000)
- Contract with ConFire to provide 24/7/365 emergency response BC coverage (\$500,000)
- Hire part-time administrative assistance (\$36,000)
- Contract out for special services (investigation, Haz Mat, Water Rescue, etc.) (\$175,000 \$240,000)
- Total: \$ 1.3 to \$1.5 million (does not count start up cost, vehicles, office space, etc.)





Fire Impact - Survival

















Fire Impact - Months Displaced



Fire Impact - Cost to Repair


















Typical Homeowners Insurance

- Policy Coverage = \$1,000,000
- Debris Removal = (\$ 50,000)
- Code Upgrade = \$ 100,000 (10% of Policy Coverage)
- Grand Total of Coverage = \$1,050,000

- Replacement Cost (2,000 sq ft x's \$600) = (\$1,200,000)
- Cash Needed to Rebuild = \$150,000 + any deductible
















Protection Grades across California
